SPEAKERS AND PRESENTERS

David Bradley

David Bradley was recruited by national leaders of the Community Action movement in 1981 to defend the Community Action Program from complete elimination. With Bob Cord of ABCD in Boston, MA, and Charles Braithwait of West Central Missouri Community Action Agency in Appleton City, MO, Bradley founded the National Community Action Foundation (NCAF) to preserve and create opportunities for the Community Action Agency network. His first act was to design the Community Services Block Grant (CSBG), which preserved the federal-to-local funding pipeline through Community Action Agencies for the purpose of mitigating the causes and conditions of poverty. He has succeeded in growing the federal investment in CSBG for more than four decades and has expanded the ability of CAAs to address the complex and changing needs of low-income people and communities. David's legislative activities also include Weatherization Assistance, the Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program and other programs that address local causes and conditions of poverty.

Lisa Brewer, PCC

Lisa Brewer Coaching

Lisa Brewer coaches goal-oriented professionals and organizations to strengthen their leadership, teamwork, career advancement, and wellbeing. Frequent coaching topics include communication, influence, strategic planning, relationship building, productivity, delegation, self-talk, habit formation, and work-life balance. She holds an MBA from Ross School of Business, a BS in Psychology, and four coaching certifications. Her professional experience includes Fortune 500 companies, law and IT firms, and several non-profits. She was the Executive Director Nurture, a nonprofit that provided wellness classes to low-income families and elementary students, and has taught workshops on habit formation, self-care, productivity, communication, and career fulfillment for several organizations.

Denise Harlow

Denis Harlow, CCAP, is the Chief Executive Officer of the National Community Action Partnership, a national hub that links the nation's 1.000+ Community Action Agencies to each other and to federal, state, and local leaders looking to connect Americans to greater opportunity. She was appointed the Partnership's CEO in 2014 after serving as Senior Director of Training and Technical Assistance and Interim Chief Operating Officer. Working with Community Action Network Partners, Denise was instrumental in the design and deployment of network-wide Organizational Standards and was a leader in the recent update to the Community Action performance management framework. She started her Community Action career as a social worker with the Schenectady Community Action Program. She holds a Master's Degree in Social Work from the University at Albany and a Bachelor's Degree in Social Work from Valparaiso University.

Senator Jerry Ortiz y Pino

Senator Ortiz y Pino is a 12th generation New Mexican whose career has been dedicated to leadership in health and human services and higher education in both private and public sectors, He served as the Director of Family and Community Services for the City of Albuquerque, and Division Director for New Mexico Social Services. He was elected to State Senate District 12 in 2004, and retired in 2024 after serving five four-year terms. Legislative areas of focus were health, behavioral health, and children's services. He also sponsored major legislation pertaining to the Working Families Tax Credit, Cannabis legalization (Medical and Recreational), Home visitation Programs, Guardianship reform, Charter School supports and prison reform.

Michelle Suina, PH.D.

Michele Suina, PhD, is a tribal member of Cochiti Pueblo. She currently is a Program Director at the Albuquerque Area Southwest Tribal Epidemiology Center for the Good Health and Wellness in Indian Country Program. Michele is a health educator and chose this career pathway to contribute to the vitality of Native Americans and to help transform western based public health approaches so tribes can realize their own self-defined health goals. In 2015, Michele graduated from Arizona State University School of Social Transformation with the first Pueblo PhD Justice Studies Cohort. Her scholarly interests include research ethics and health education approaches grounded in Indigenous Knowledge Systems.
